About

The National Easter School for Arts Fundraising and Leadership will take place in April 2019 for its fifth year.

Led by the School of Performance and Cultural Industries at the University of Leeds as part of the Arts Fundraising & Philanthropy Programme, this week-long residential course for arts professionals and fundraisers is led by academics, senior practitioners and consultants from the arts and cultural sector.

You will gain critical insight into useful case studies and an academic context in which to discuss the skills required to lead and develop arts organisations in ever more challenging times.

Focusing on arts fundraising and leadership, the course explores topics such as the history of philanthropy, how to manage change, how to build resilience, and how to instil values into fundraising and development activity.

As well as a week of intensive study and practical activity, the course also offers time out for reflection – a rare chance for delegates to step back from the day-to-day pressures of working life in the arts to share ideas with like-minded colleagues, and actively engage in new thinking and strategic planning.

Who is the course for?

A limited number of places are available to arts managers and fundraisers who would like to develop their careers as arts leaders, whether leading development teams or entire organisations. A minimum of three years' experience in the arts and cultural sector is required.

In addition, there will be Professional Fundraising Fellows from across England attending the Easter School in 2019. These Fellows have been selected for their leadership potential and will therefore bring a huge breadth of experience from across the arts and cultural sector.

This combination of experience, bringing together the next generation of arts and cultural leaders, is central to the dynamic of the residential, and it enables all participants to learn from their peers as well as from the tutors and guest speakers.

Course content

The Easter School will be delivered through a balanced mix of lectures, tutorials, panel discussions, group activities, small group project work and group presentations.

In addition, you will visit nearby arts and cultural organisations which will provide you with the opportunity to listen to, question and network with leaders from the arts and cultural sector.

As well as a full daytime schedule, you will also be required to undertake project work during the evenings.

Terms and conditions

Delegates will receive a refund of monies paid if the Arts Fundraising & Philanthropy office receives written notification of cancellation at least 30 days before the event takes place. Delegates will receive a 50% refund of monies paid if the Arts Fundraising & Philanthropy office receives written notification of cancellation at least 14 days before the event takes place. Alternatively, the value of the booking can be transferred to another qualifying member of staff at the same rate. The booking may be transferred to another person within the same organisation at any point. Delegate places are not interchangeable over the duration (ie delegate places cannot be shared between individuals).



Postgraduate Certificate in Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy

The Easter School is validated by the University of Leeds. Upon successful completion of the two related assessments, it represents half of the credits (30/60) required for a Postgraduate Certificate (PG Cert) in Arts Fundraising and Philanthropy.

Participants attending the School will have the opportunity to apply for the Postgraduate Certificate if they choose to do so. Please note that an additional cost will apply for transfer on to the PG Cert.
